4-H Focus

Meetings can be a place where people come together to accomplish much on behalf of a group or organization. It is important to have a process in place so your meeting is productive. Proper management of a meeting is important to assure effective use of everyone's time. In 4-H, we utilize a meeting management process called parliamentary procedure, also known as Parli-pro, to conduct our 4-H business meetings. This is based off Robert's Rules of Order. Parli-pro gives structure, processes, and consistency to each 4-H meeting. It provides a framework for those running the meeting, while enabling participants to have their voices heard. As you participate in meetings with other organizations, you may see similarities in how those meetings are run. This is because Parli-pro is a universal meeting management concept.

Learning Life Skills

In 4-H, we are all about providing positive youth development experiences. In order to do that, we follow The Eight Essential Elements of Positive Youth Development. The Essential Elements are summarized into four key concepts:





Belonging, Independence, Mastery, and Generosity. Each of the eight Essential Elements provides a basis for 4-H programming that assures a positive learning experience is taking place for all youth.

Belonging

- Essential Element: A positive relationship with a caring adult
- Essential Element: An inclusive environment
- Essential Element: A safe emotional and physical environment

Mastery

- Essential Element: Opportunity for mastery
- Essential Element: Engagement in learning

Independence

- Essential Element: Opportunity to see oneself as an active participant in the future
- Essential Element: Opportunity for self-determination

Generosity

· Essential Element: Opportunity to value and practice service to others

Planning Resources

Picking the right 4-H project(s) for you can be a challenge. It's like standing in the toy aisle trying to pick just one or trying to find the next show to binge watch on Netflix. There are so many options, yet so little time. However, the following questions should help guide you through the process:

- What are your passions and interests? The sky is the limit, because chances are 4-H has it (or at least something close to it). It's important that your 4-H project(s) excite you, otherwise you might get bored of them.
- What are your career goals? 4-H is a fantastic opportunity for you to test-drive career fields through 4-H project learning. If you don't have career goals yet, that is okay too.
- What are your limits, if any? With anything, it's important that we know our limits, whether time, money, space, etc. However, your answer to this question should not be a final determining factor. Chances are there are still ways for you to participate in a project that fits within your passions and interests. For example, maybe you love horses, but you live in town so you can't own a horse. There are still options for you to be involved in the horse project; maybe you could board your horse at a stable. If that isn't an option due to other limiting factors, you could participate on a Horse Quiz Bowl team or in Hippology, an equine veterinary and management knowledge test. Before you make a final decision to eliminate a 4-H project area due to limits, contact your county 4-H Youth Program Advisor to discuss options.
- Who do you have to support you with your project(s)? Perhaps it's a parent, or 4-H club leader, or 4-H Youth
 Program Advisor. Regardless of whom you pick, it's important that you have an adult mentor helping to guide
 you through your 4-H project(s).
