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Become a Master Gardener

You can become a Master Gardener by:

- Successfully completing the 40-hour training program
- Providing 40 hours of volunteer service within the community
- Continuing to learn and volunteer

Master Gardener training is provided once per year by South Dakota State University faculty and staff and consists of both online and in-person lessons.

The 40-hour training program provides research-based information about lawncare, landscape trees and shrubs, plant diseases, plant nutrition, vegetables, fruits, houseplants, home landscape design and more.

After training, trainees must complete 40 hours of volunteer service in 12 months to complete a MG internship and become a fully certified Master Gardener.

After the training and initial 40-hour internships is complete, SDSU Extension Master Gardeners can maintain their Master Gardener title by providing 20 hours of volunteer service and 10 hours of continuing education annually.

Local Master Gardener clubs are a great way to get connected to community projects and like-minded individuals. The SDSU Extension Master Gardener Program office can also assist Master Gardeners in finding ways to fulfill their service requirement.
