

South Dakota State 4-H Shoot Classifying CMP Rifles



Excluded Guns (Per National 4-H): Any firearm built or modified to give the distinct impression of a "modern military" style firearm such as an AR or AK is not allowed in the 4-H Shooting Sports Program. Examples of unacceptable firearm components include: any type of muzzle devices (muzzle brake, recoil compensator, suppressors, porting), front pistol grips, heat shield/shroud, and magazines extending more than two inches below the receiver (December 2023).

riease	aliswei	the following questions about the CMP guil to be used by the 4-H Member:
YES	NO	Does the gun have a thumbhole stock? Any stock where the thumb reaches THROUGH the stock, or a stock cutout is a thumbhole stock.
YES	NO	Does the stock have a configuration different than conventional sporter-type stock constructed of wood or synthetic material? (A folding stock would be an example)
YES	NO	Does the stock have a readily adjustable butt-plate or cheekpiece that can be adjusted without the use of tools (folding, push-button, etc). No changes are permitted once set.
YES	NO	Does the stock have a non-standard or orthopedic shape to the cheek riser/Monte Carlo cheekpiece (vs the standard rolled top)? Fixed, symmetrical added pads are considered standard.
YES	NO	Is the gun of the Modern Military Rifle (AR clone), with pistol grip as an integral part of the action (pistol grip is not integral with the buttstock)
YES	NO	Is the pistol grip asymmetrical when viewed from the top or does it have an orthopedic shape?
YES	NO	Does the rifle have a barrel that is fluted/grooved/checkered in any way, or does it have a non-standard contour ?
YES	NO	Does the gun have a rail or adjustable sling swivel? (a single M-Loc is not considered adjustable)

If ANY of the above questions were answered "YES" the gun is classified as T/U-Class (TACTICAL/UNLIMITED)

- T/U Class Guns and Sights: These guns must still follow the 4-H "Excluded Guns" restriction above.
- TU-Class rifles may have any **standard** sights (open sights, aperture or scoped). Scopes may be of any power, fixed or adjustable, but must be **set and fixed to 6x or less**.
 - The scope with variable magnification will be secured with tape or other similar means so that the magnification cannot be changed during firing.
 - O Illuminated reticles are acceptable, as are optically enhanced sights (dot sights). However, *laser sights* that are projecting a dot (on the target)- are *not* allowed.

If ALL of the above questions were answered "NO", the gun is classified as O-Class (OPEN SIGHT) or T-Class (TELESCOPIC SIGHT)

O-Class or T-Class guns must still follow the 4-H "Excluded Guns" restriction above.

Standard Sporter O-Class (OPEN SIGHTS) or T-Class (TELESCOPIC SIGHT) guns must meet the following:

O-Class guns must be equipped with an open rear sight (U, V, or square notch) and a bead or post front sight.

- An aperture (ring) front sight may not be used in O-Class. An aperture sight is shot in T-Class.
- Hooded front sights may be used in the O-Class, but a target or tunnel-type front sight with interchangeable inserts is not allowed. Interchangeable inserts make the gun a T-Class gun.
- The open rear sights may be adjustable for windage and elevation.

T-Class guns may be equipped with an adjustable receiver (peep) sight or a scope that does not exceed a 6x setting.

- Variable power scopes may be used if they are adjusted to no more than 6x magnification.
 - The scope with variable magnification will be secured with tape or other similar means so that the magnification cannot be changed during firing.
 - O Illuminated reticles are acceptable, as are optically enhanced sights (dot sights). However, *laser sights* that are projecting a dot (on the target)- are *not* allowed.
- **Aperture-type receiver sights:** Guns with aperture or receiver sights may be shot as T-Class rifles, depending on gun configuration.
