

Replacing Legal and Financial Documents in South Dakota

There are many reasons South Dakotans may need to replace legal and financial documents: range or house fires, tornadoes, flooding, death of the owner, or loss or theft of the document. Replacing these documents helps prevent identity theft, continue benefits, provide financial security, complete estate settlements, etc. The list below covers various document types that may be lost, destroyed, or stolen and provides sources for information to replace them.

Several documents require contacting “Your” banker, agent, attorney, etc. A list of these contacts, including company, contact names, and phone numbers, should be kept in your cell phone contact list and a file saved to the mass storage device, ensuring you can find them when needed. It would also help to keep the contact numbers for your credit card companies. If you need to replace them, cancel numbers due to loss or theft, or arrange alternative payment plans due to tragedy, this contact information will speed up the recovery process.

In today’s electronic age, all essential papers can be scanned and saved to an external hard drive or other portable mass storage device (jump drive, CD, etc.). Keeping these devices in a fireproof/waterproof locked box other than your home or office helps reduce the probability of them being destroyed due to a fire or flood at your primary location. For example, entrusting a copy to a family member or friend 300 miles away helps prevent loss from other natural disasters, including but not limited to tornadoes, range fires, lightning storms, and flooding. Records should be updated annually to ensure the most expedient replacement.

This list may not be all-inclusive for you or your business. Keep your personal and business lists updated and accurate.

Passports	<p>Call the National Passport Information Center at 1-877-487-2778</p> <p>Report a lost or stolen passport and find a form for renewal at: travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/have-passport.html. Fill out the form "Statement Regarding Lost or Stolen Passport, DS-64. Then click on "How to Renew a Passport."</p>
Property Deeds	<p>Contact the Register of Deeds in the county where the property is located.</p>
Property Tax	<p>Contact the Treasurer in the county where the property is located.</p>
Social Security Card	<p>Contact your local Social Security Office</p> <p>ssa.gov/number-card/replace-card</p> <p>Call 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778)</p> <p>The application for a Social Security card (Form SS-5) can be downloaded from socialsecurity.gov/online/ss-5.pdf.</p>
Stock Certificates	<p>Contact any brokerage firm (fees may be involved).</p>
US Savings Bond	<p>Visit treasurydirect.gov/savings-bonds/manage-bonds/lost-stolen-destroyed-ee-or-i-bonds/ to begin the replacement process either by mail or online.</p> <p>The Federal Reserve Bank for U.S. Savings Bonds is serviced in South Dakota by the:</p> <p>Treasury Retail Securities Services PO Box 9150 Minneapolis, MN 55480-9150 844-284-2676</p>
Vehicle Titles and Registration	<p>Contact the local County Treasurers Office</p> <p>Visit dor.sd.gov/newsroom/find-out-how-to-replace-your-lost-title/. The site includes the required forms and all vehicle title-related information.</p>
Will and Legal Documents	<p>Contact the attorney who prepared it.</p>
